Cooperation for the Crayfish...and Kids

Without even owning the land, the Bay County Conservancy is creating a new home for the Panama City Crayfish and a study/research area for students at Mosley High School. Many partners are coming together to achieve this result: Lynn Haven owns the land, Department of Environmental Protection oversees the land, **Patty Kelly** of U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service and **John Himes** of Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission are restoring the land to be hospitable to the crayfish, and Ms. **Tammy Stundon**, science teacher at Mosley, plans to send her students across the street to conduct ecological projects.

Bay County Conservancy is coordinating all the parties and hoping eventually to make part of this conservation area open to the public for an interpretive walking trail. Ms. Stundon said "What better place to go on a field trip than in your back yard! With such close proximity to our campus, we will be able to collect data on a regular basis. We want the students to take ownership in this project." The first step occurred when the Lynn Haven City Commission approved a Management Agreement. Next, the biologists will submit their detailed restoration plan. The students will collect some preliminary data for comparison after restoration.

Why is the BCC, a land trust, doing this project? The Board of Directors decided that the value to the community and the opportunity to increase valuable wildlife habitat was worth the effort.

BCC to Plant Wildflowers for FLOR500

In the months to come, BCC will be planting Florida wildflowers as part of FLOR500 – a participatory art, nature, and history project commemorating Florida's quincentenary (500 year birthday) in 2013. The project marks the importance of the moment when the history of Florida changed forever and gives a glimpse of what its landscape was like 500 years ago. Scientists across the state have identified 500 native wildflowers that were around when Ponce de Leon landed and named the state Florida. Schools, communities and individuals have been invited to plant wildflower gardens for each of the project's 500 wildflowers and dedicate them to someone who was a part of Florida's history – or to a local Floridian who is special to them. These new native habitats will help support Florida's biodiversity.

BCC will be planting wildflowers at the Mary Ola Reynolds Miller Palm Preserve located in downtown Panama City on Beach Drive. Happenings at Juniper Headwaters Nature Preserve

In the last year, BCC has worked hard to try and eradicate the remaining popcorn trees on the preserve. The property was finally burned by the Forestry Service in an attempt to clear out some of the underbrush and let native plants regenerate, and a loop trail has been marked out. BCC hopes to develop a trail map in the near future.



Bees Find Sweet Home on BCC Properties

As you drive down a busy street in town and notice that some of the trees, vines, and flowers are blooming, did you ever think about the bees that might be visiting those flowers? A beekeeper from Fountain did. After requesting permission from the Bay County Conservancy and after checking with Panama City about their mosquito spraying pattern, **Bob Grant** positioned a trailer full of beehives on the King Family Preserve for six weeks.

All parties were happy with the results. The bees found plenty of flowers to sip nectar from, Mr. Grant had honey to harvest and sell, and the BCC received the benefit of having pollinators active on their native habitat to keep the plants reproducing.

Annual Meeting Notes

BCC's 13th Annual Meeting was held on March 31st at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Bay County. Despite early morning rain storms, several BCC members joined Vice President **Ron Houser** for a walk at the Audubon Nature Preserve. Walkers saw a marsh rabbit and heard warblers, a Carolina wren and marsh wrens.

At the meeting itself, guests learned about BCC's purchase of an addition to Marjorie's Magical Marsh—Symone's Sanctimonious Swamp—an important acquisition because it contains habitat suitable for the Panama

City Crayfish, which Fish and Wildlife biologists have identified on the site. Wildlife Biologist Patty Kelly and Northwest Regional Biologist John Himes described their work involving



crayfish restoration on BCC properties.

BCC welcomed new Board member Jennifer Trusty, **Ph.D.**, to the Board of Directors, and the year's nominated slate of Directors was approved for re-election to the Board. (Candis Harbison, Jackie Kolk, Carolyn Parell, and Ted Wilson were nominated for reelection. Jen Trusty will serve her first term).

Audubon Nature Preserve Update

The last several years have brought noticeable change to Audubon Nature Preserve, the first property BCC acquired. Prolonged drought-like conditions meant little, if any, standing water in the area known as "Doctors' Pond". As a result, opportunistic plant species such as saltbush, grapevine, blackberry and alligator weed are growing where they once could not. Wood ducks are no longer seen in our boxes, because there has been no water for them. But on the positive side, this year has seen almost normal rain conditions and reappearance of water in the pond. Whether this is just a short-term change is anyone's guess.

We are still waging war on the popcorn trees, which have proved to be very difficult to eradicate completely. We have hired a local company to help us out (if it stops raining). We also have a local teenager, **Alan Gorchov**, who has volunteered to help us there to satisfy some academic community service hours. But he admits he loves to kill popcorn trees too. Where do we find more kids like this?...For some quiet time, the boardwalk and gazebo remains a great place to come



and enjoy the sights and sounds of nature, to eat a lunch or to read a book.

Although the 1.5 acre parcel is not large in size, the addition is important to BCC and to Fish & Wildlife biologists because it contains habitat suitable for the Panama City Crayfish.
